‘A Couple of Things I Know About Improvisation from Hanging Out with Samoan Orators and Jazz Musicians’

Abstract

The ethnographer is a sympathetic agent of literacy/the written in contexts where oral performance, or other kinds of performance, are dynamic. Is there any sense in which the management of fieldwork and its uncertainties/surprises themselves can be construed as an 'art' of improvisation or, is this mere ideology (imperialist nostalgia even) given what` improvisation really is --in jazz, in samoan oratory in their historical situations? What is at stake in thinking about the contingencies of fieldwork and the ethnographic accounts that are often built up from them as relying on the craft and creativity of improvisation?
